Justin Bell journey to his current position as Executive Chef of Aiken's exclusive The Reserve Club at Woodside has been full of peaks and valleys, but his time at Helms College reinforced his determination to come out on top.

Growing up, Bell lived with his mother and grandparents, who encouraged him to help out in the kitchen from the age of 4. Devoted to his family, Bell turned down a full scholarship to the University of Georgia to stay home and help care for his ailing grandmother; little did he know she would pass away only a few days later. Bell contacted UGA, but it was too late to change his decision. He had to come up with a new plan.

Bell enrolled at Augusta University and took a job at North Augusta Country Club while working on his B.B.A. When the club's new owner suddenly shut the doors, Bell found himself out of a job. Then, just two weeks later, his home caught fire.

Now jobless and homeless, Bell found himself once again in need of a new plan. That's when his mother gave him an application for Helms College's culinary program in Augusta. He decided to give it a shot.

Helms College was just what Bell needed to bring calm to his life and return to what he learned in his grandmother's kitchen. After graduating in 2013, his career took off, leading to one success after another.

He encourages those down on their luck and seeking direction. "Don't be afraid to put yourself out there. You need to be consistent and constantly pursue opportunities."

5. Attend Helms College.

Whether Culinary Arts or in Health Services, Helms College teaches the technical skills needed to continue on the set career path.

6. Paid Experiential Training. Goodwill's entrepreneurial business enterprises give students the opportunity to get paid training in their field of study while continuing their education at Helms College.





8. Career Placement.

Career Placement Advisors who have worked with students throughout the journey will help them land their dream job in the Culinary Arts or Health Services Field.





Simply put, the economy and people of Aiken are ideally suited to benefit from a major expansion of Helms College. Since opening in 2011, Goodwill's Aiken Campus on Pine Log Road has served 19,927 individuals and placed 4,148 into competitive employment.



The Helms Advantage is a highly successful model with a proven track record. On average at Helms College's flagship campuses in Macon and Augusta, 74% of students complete their program of study, compared to the 39% national six-year average completion rate for community colleges.

Helms College's specialized student niche opens the door to partnership with local technical colleges and secondary schools. Aiken County Public Schools (ACPS) has demonstrated strong support of Helms

College. Already, an articulation agreement is in place to give students Helms College coursework credit for completion of secondary-level culinary arts programs, saving them thousands of tuition dollars. This initiative has inspired ACPS and Helms College to explore other opportunities for collaboration, working on a more comprehensive partnership agreement.

Additionally, Helms College also holds active articulation agreements with Johnson and Wales University and The Art Institute of Atlanta, paving the way for Helms College's

associate of applied science degree graduates to transfer smoothly into the prestigious culinary arts baccalaureate programs of these highly regarded institutions.

With a diversity of institutions working together to better the lives of Aiken citizens, program participants will get the support they need to succeed, local business will gain motivated, well-trained workers, and the area economy will have the employees it needs to thrive.

The Leisure and Hospitality segment in Aiken County employment has risen to fourth place as a percentage of total employment, and is one of only four employment sectors that has had sustained employment growth since 2002.

School of Hospitality Culinary Lab and Catering Kitchen Investment: \$686,000

Academic Achievement & Regional Career Center

The Academic Achievement Center (AAC) will provide students with resources for academic remediation, tutoring and completion of secondary education, as well as space to concentrate and develop effective study habits, and explore Helms College and other higher education options. Enhancing our community-based Aiken Career Center will give Aiken residents ready access to Helms College's educational programs, career counseling and job placement services.
